#### Introduction

In 2023 the International Association for the Integrational Study of Language and Communication (IAISLC) celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. In 2015 IAISLC will celebrate the tenth anniversary of its first publication: working with Charlotte Conrad and the late Rita Harris, the editor compiled a bibliography of publications by and about Roy Harris that was the first publication issued by the IAISLC. Since that bibliography appeared in 2015 IAISLC has published a series of collected papers by several of its members, and this year the first monograph was published.

My original aim for a publishing project was to make writings by members of the association easily and cheaply available. It was in fact a rather selfish move: having lost my library priviledges upon retiring, most of what I had always been able to obtain freely and easily was suddenly only available if I were willing to pay on average 40\$ per article. To obtain the 1000+ items listed in the bibliography would have cost me about 40,000 USD. In contrast, by purchasing everything in this catalogue the reader can obtain 160 articles (not counting prefaces and introductions), 1 bibliography and 1 monograph for a whopping 359\$ USD, which is approximately 2.22\$ USD per article. And the authors will each receive all of the monies not taken by the printer and the distributors.

Talbot J. Taylor is the Louise G.T. Cooley Professor of Linguistics at William & Mary. He is the author of *Theorizing Language* (1997) and *Mutual Misunderstanding* (1993) and co-author of *Landmarks in Linguistic Thought* (vol. 1, 1997; vol. 2, 2001) and *Apes, Language, and the Human Mind* (1998). His journal articles and book chapters since 1980 have addressed issues in linguistic normativity, reflexive and metalinguistic practices, child language development, integrational linguistics, conversation analysis, ape language research, the ontology and epistemology of linguistics research, linguistic historiography, and the language ideas of Ludwig Wittgensetein.

This volume originated with papers presented at the online conference entitled Integrationism and Language *Ideologies* (March 15-20, 2021), which was organized by the Language Policy Group of the Federal University of Santa Catarina in conjunction with the *International Association* for the Integrational Study of Language and Communication (IAISLC). The contributions in this issue are for the most part revised versions of the conference papers presented at the event. The special issue also features an interview with David Bade as well as a Portuguese translation by Cristine Severo and Ana Cláudia Eltermann of one of Harris' texts (The integrationist critique of orthodox linguistics). The present volume introduces key ideas on Roy Harris' integrational linguistics to a Lusophone readership by highlighting relevant issues in language ideology, linguistic methodology, decolonial linguistics and (socio)-linguistic theory. The various contributions all underline the necessity to rethink (or 'demythologize') the semiological and philosophical foundations of orthodox linguistics and a need to develop a theory of communication in which language is treated as an integrated mode rather than a segregated object.
